In this guide, the words 'must' or 'must not' are used where there is a legal requirement to do (or not do) something. The word 'should' is used where there is established legal guidance or best practice that is likely to help you avoid breaking the law.

This guidance is for England, Scotland and Wales

Certain animal diseases are 'notifiable', which means that you are legally required to report cases (including suspected cases) to the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA).

If you find or suspect any of the diseases listed in this guide, you must contact APHA immediately. The contact numbers are:
